# Virtual Connect environment: 3 Key Components to a VC Infrastructure



## Virtual Connect Ethernet Modules

- Connect selected server Ethernet ports to specific data center networks.
- Supports aggregation/tagging of uplinks to data center.
- 'LAN-safe' for connection to any data center switch environment (Cisco, Nortel, HP ProCurve, etc.)



## Virtual Connect Fibre Channel Modules

- Selectively aggregate multiple server FC HBA ports (Qlogic/Emulex) on a FC uplink using NPIV.
- Connect enclosure to Brocade, Cisco, McData, or Qlogic data center FC switches.
- Doesn't appear as a switch to the FC fabric.

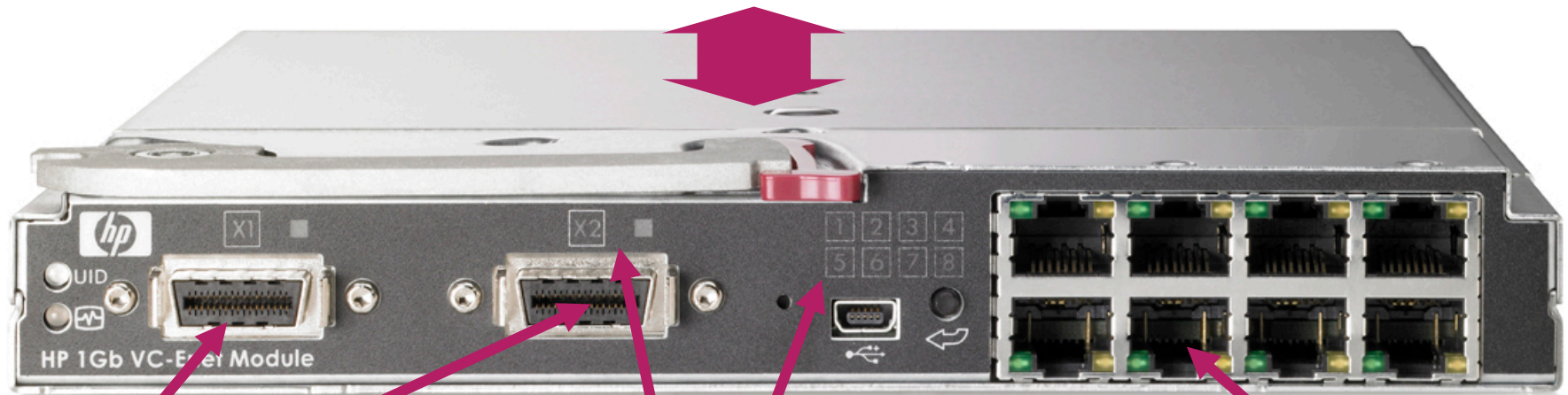

# A Few Questions to Anticipate

Q: Is the Virtual Connect Ethernet module a switch?

A: No. It is a bridging device. More to the point, it is based upon IEEE802.1 Industry Standard Bridging Technologies.

Q: How does the Virtual Connect Ethernet module avoid network loops?

A: It does so by doing two things. First the VC-E makes sure that there is only one active uplink (or uplink LAG) for any single network at any one time so traffic can't loop through from uplink to uplink. Second, the VC-E automatically discovers all the internal stacking links and uses an internal loop prevention algorithm to ensure there are no loops caused by the stacking links. None of the internal loop prevention traffic ever shows up on uplinks or would go to the external switch.

Q: Is the Virtual Connect Ethernet module running Spanning Tree?

A: VC uses an internal loop prevention algorithm that only shows up on stacking links. VC-E does not run spanning tree protocol on network uplinks. This internal loop prevention prevent loops by creating an internal tree within the confines of the VC environment.

Q: Will the "HP loop prevention technology" interact with my existing network's Spanning Tree?

A: No. The VC-E device will be treated as an end point, or dead-end device on the existing network. The loop prevention technology is only utilized on stacking links internal to a VC Domain and never shows up on uplinks into the data center.



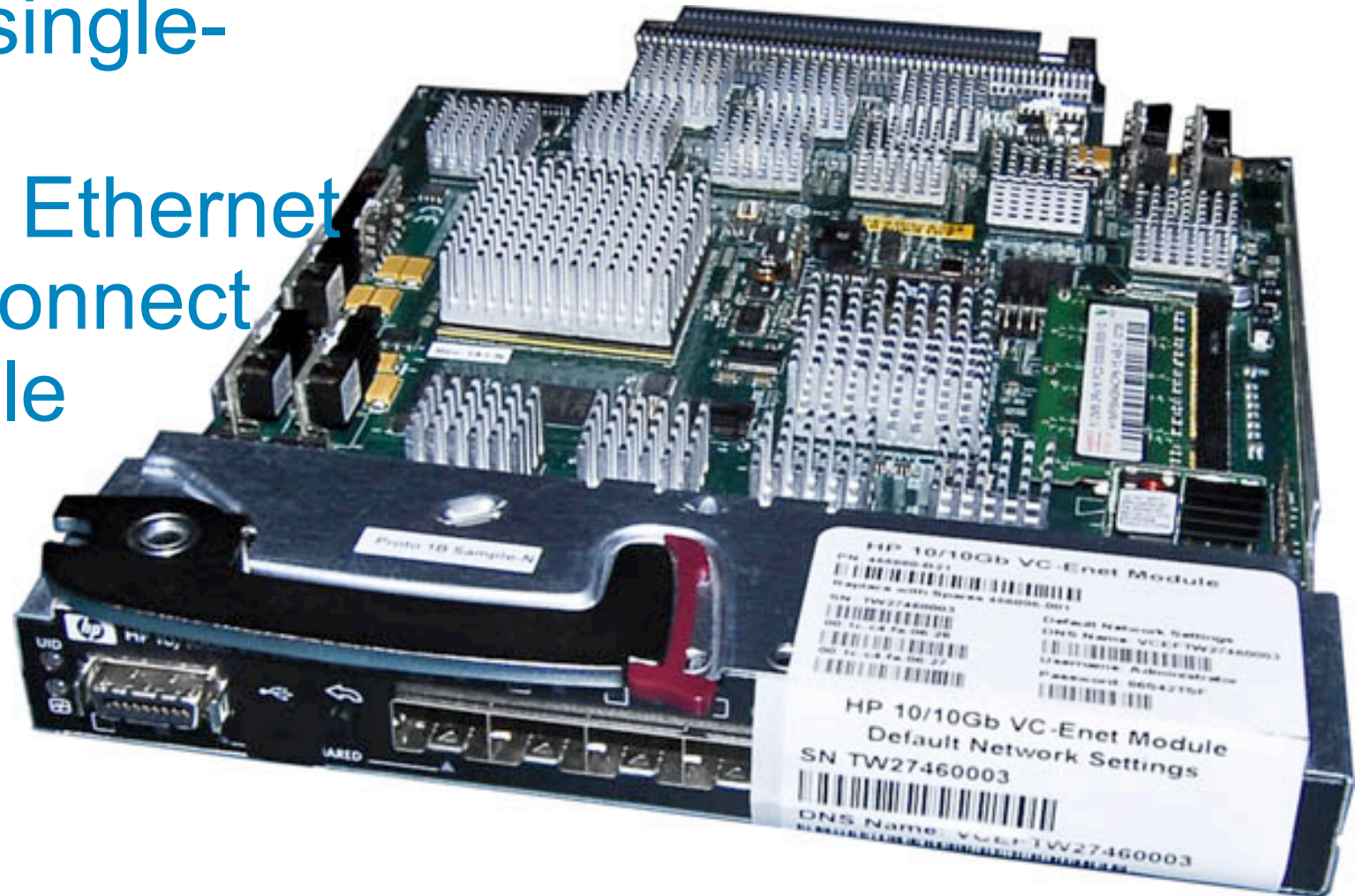

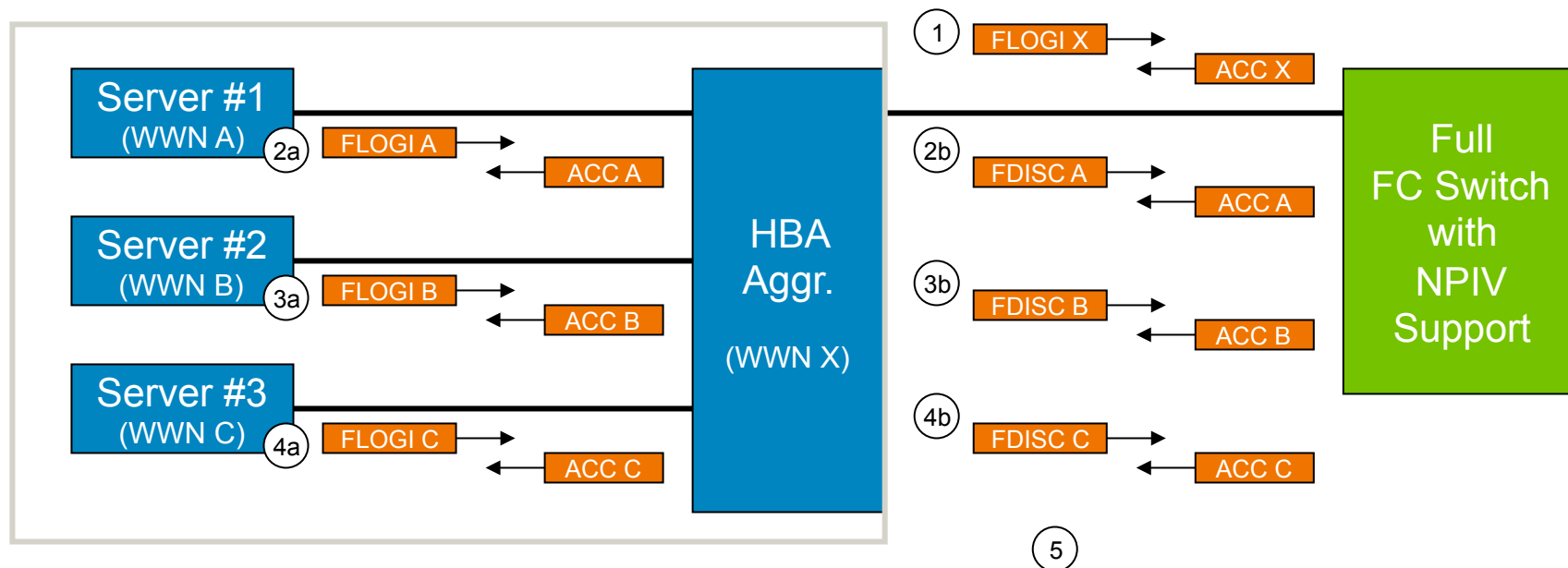


# HP Virtual Connect FC Module uses N\_Port\_ID Virtualization

- Defined by the T11 FC standards
  - FC Device Attach (FC-DA) Specification, Section 4.13
  - FC Link Services (FC-LS) Specification
- “NPIV provides a Fibre Channel facility for assigning multiple N\_Port\_IDs to a single N\_Port, thereby allowing multiple distinguishable entities on the same physical port.”
- Where is it used?
  - When implemented within a FC HBA, allows unique WWNs & IDs for each virtual machine within a server
  - Can be used by a transparent HBA aggregator device (like HP VC-FC module) to reduce cables in a vendor-neutral fashion.

# Dynamic vs Static Login Distribution

- Static Login Distribution
  - Pre VC 1.3x FW method of mapping blade HBA port connections to VC FC uplink ports.
  - Not Flexible, cannot change mapping rules
  - Manage uplink login by purposeful placement of blades in the enclosure.
  - Difficult to configure load balancing for some blade server classes, BL870

# Dynamic vs Static Login Distribution

- Dynamic Login Distribution
  - Post VC 1.3x FW Default method of mapping blade HBA port connections to VC FC uplink ports.
  - Provides failover and failback within the VC fabric.
  - Ability to redistribute logins on the VC fabric.
  - No need to worry about server blade placement to VC uplink port connections.
  - Flexibility to create Multiple VC Fabrics and assign specific hosts to uplink ports

# What is different with Integrity Servers?

- BL860c, BL870c
- Size: BL860c is a full height blade like the BL680c with 4 embedded NICs.
- BL870c is double width. But connectors are only on the right slot. Important for dynamic logging.
- EFI instead of BIOS

### Target Port Name

The world-wide port name of the controller interface on the Fibre Channel storage target. The port name is a 64-bit identifier and must be entered as NN:NN:NN:NN:NN:NN:NN:NN, where 'N' is a hexadecimal value (0-F).

# The process step by step

## Proliant Integrity

- Create a VC profile with valid SAN and LAN ports and the boot parameters
  - The VC sets automatically the BIOS boot order and the FC mezzanine setup
  - Present a SAN LUN to the WWID of the SAN port
  - Install the O/S by virtual media or RDP
- Create a VC profile with valid SAN and LAN ports
  - Do not configure boot parameters yet
  - Present a SAN LUN to the WWID of the SAN port
  - Install the O/S by virtual media or Ignite-UX or RDP
  - During installation select the SAN lun as system disk
  - The installation creates automatically the primary boot entry from SAN
  - When installation is finished, power of the blade
  - Edit the VC profile, add the boot parameters
  - Power on the blade
  - At FC card detection, the “EFI partition” icon appears.
  - All boot entries have been captured and stored in the profile



# Assigning the profile to another blade

## Proliant Integrity

- VC edits the BIOS boot order
- VC makes the FC mezzanine setup
- VC updates the nvram of the new blade
- VC writes the stored boot entries into the nvram of the new blade
- Caution:
- It does it for **all** boot entries

Before creating a profile with boot from SAN, clean up the other boot entries.

# What about VCEM?

- Needs version 1.34 of VCM and 1.2x of VCEM
- The “EFI partition” does not appear on the GUI
- No way to remove it
- Prepare the boot from SAN as for VCM
- Setup the boot parameter, power on the blade
- It is possible to check with VCM
- Once a valid “EFI partition” is created, totally transparent, same usage as Proliant blades



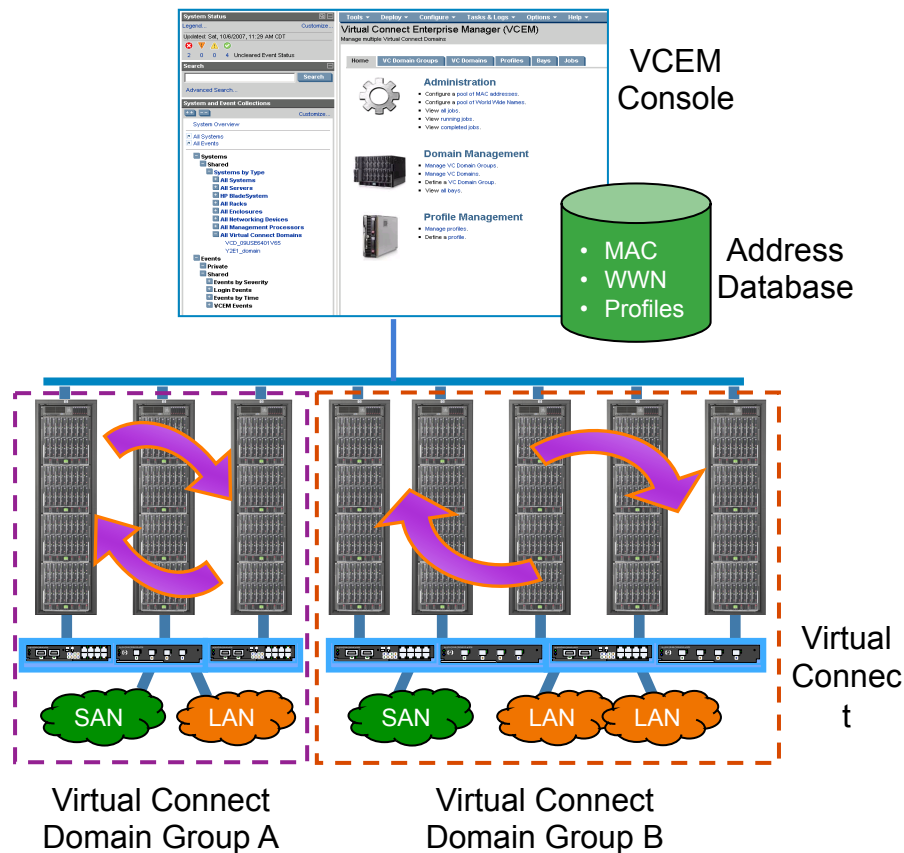

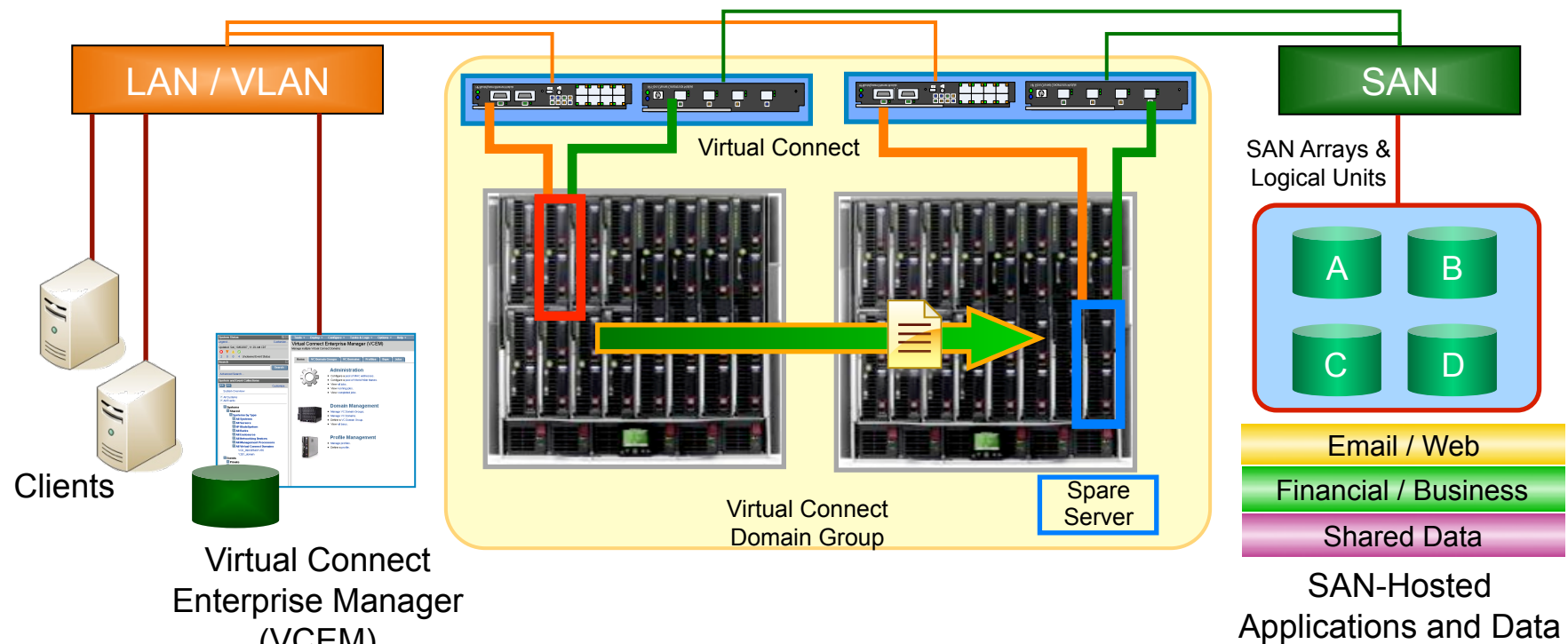
# VCEM server profile movement

## Key features



- Move blade server connection profiles between enclosures within a Virtual Connect Domain Group
  - No movement between groups
- Virtual Connect maintains consistent LAN/SAN connections
  - Network associations move with the server connection profile
- Manual/scripted profile moves
- Audit trail provides full history
- Best response times and least administration in boot from SAN environment
  - Local boot configuration typically requires additional administration

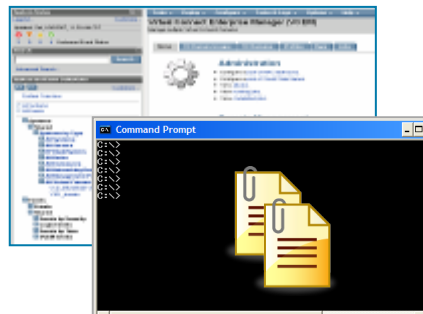
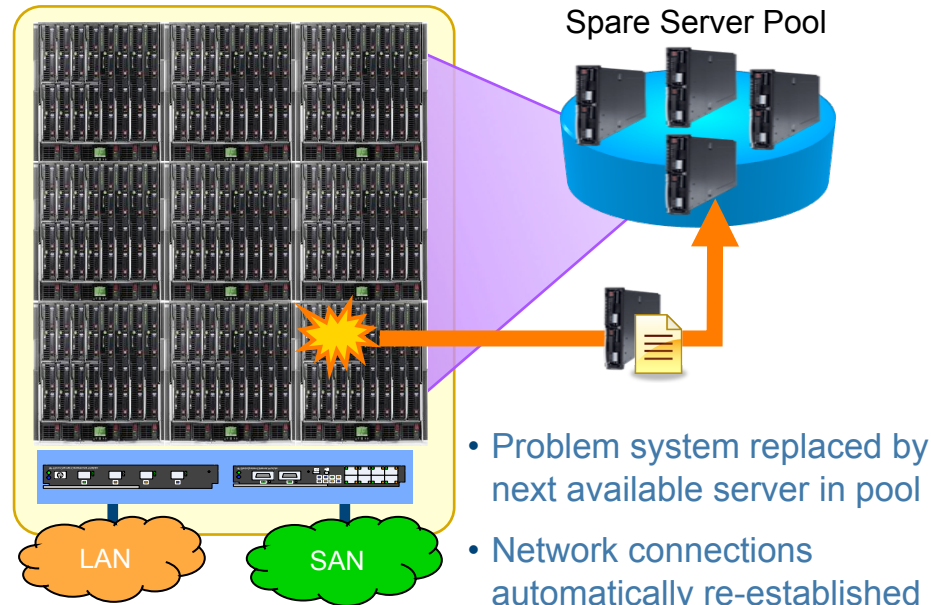

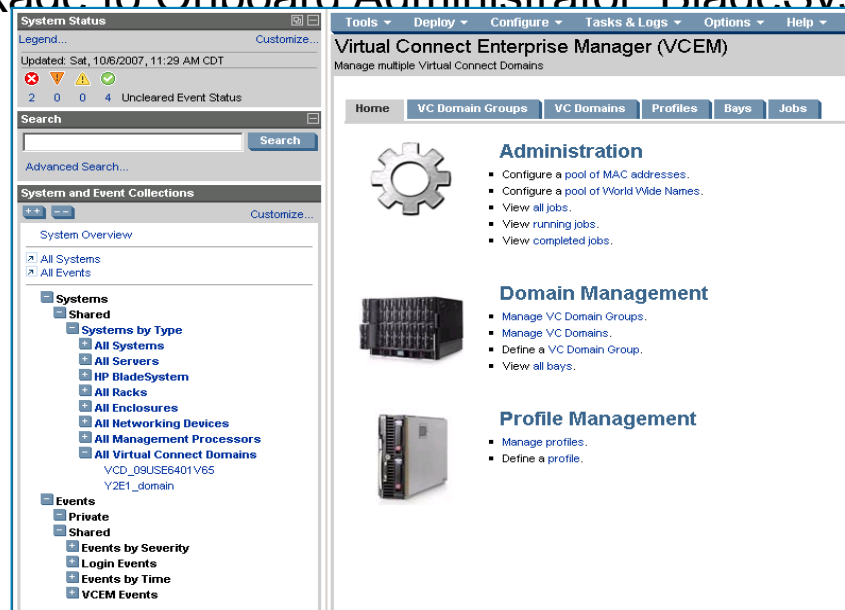

- Flexible options to initiate failover:
  - Manually select replacement server and move profile (delivered in VCEM v1.0)
  - Single task in GUI automatically selects replacement and moves profile (v1.1)
  - CLI script automatically selects server replacement and moves profile (v1.1)
  - Useable sample scripts included

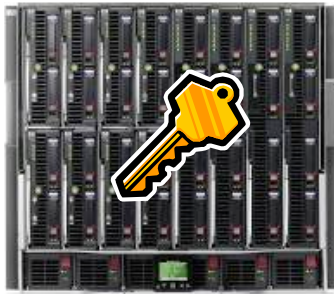
- VCEM leverages selected HP SIM services, Virtual Connect Manager and Onboard Administrator “under the covers” – (discovery, monitoring etc)
- VCEM presents a dedicated homepage
  - Focuses on Virtual Connect domain management and profile movement
  - Not a general purpose management console for servers, storage etc
  - Includes linkage to Onboard Administrator, BladeSystem Integrated Manager



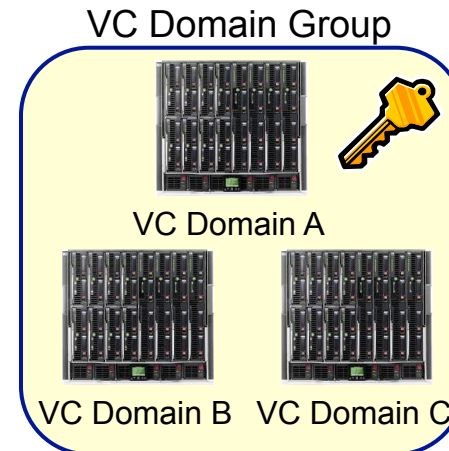


# VCEM licensing

- Introduces licensing by c-Class enclosure – 1 license per enclosure
  - Permanent license covers all enclosure bays for the life of the enclosure
  - Designed to provide broad functional readiness and exceptional value
  - Supports multiple server models and generations
  - Add, change, upgrade servers without renewing VCEM license
- License keys
  - Licenses for c7000 and c3000 enclosures (single and multiple options)
  - Evaluation licenses (90 days) available via Insight Control trial download

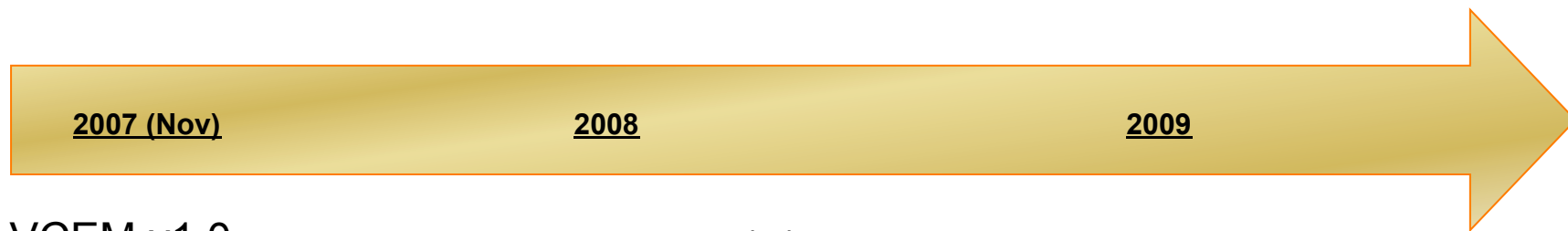

- Additional failover / automation
- Manage multi-enclosure domains
- Virtual serial numbers
- Service level integration
